Conference or Workshop: What is the Difference?

Definitions:

Single Speaker workshop – One topic is presented by one speaker with one description and set of learning objectives. Could be single day or multi-day event.

Multi-speaker workshop – Multiple presenters worked together to create a cohesive course with one description and set of learning objectives. Any of the presenters could present on the whole course. Could be single day or multi-day event.

Nonconcurrent Conference – Multiple sessions run back-to-back over the course of the day. Speakers are presenting on their own material. Could be single day or multi-day event.

Concurrent Conference – Multiple sessions offered at the same time in blocks throughout the event. Could be single day or multi-day event.

How do I know which type of event I am hosting?

- 1. Does the event have more than one speaker?
 - a. No: This is a single speaker workshop
 - b. Yes: Do attendees select from multiple sessions being held at the same time?
 - i. Yes: This is a concurrent conference
 - ii. No: Did the speakers create their own segments individually?
 - 1. Yes: This is a nonconcurrent conference
 - 2. No: Is a single focused topic covered comprehensively by one description and set of objectives?
 - a. No: This is a nonconcurrent conference
 - b. Yes: Did one person create the course and train others to present with them? OR Did a group create the course together and the speakers can present for each other?
 - i. No: This is a nonconcurrent conference
 - ii. Yes: This is a multi-speaker workshop
